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
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The Pink Granite Coast is a natural treasure of exceptional beauty.

Its famous pink-hued rocks, sculpted by the elements, offer stunning landscapes, perfect for nature and photography lovers. The coastline is dotted with sandy beaches, secret coves, and numerous protected natural sites where flora and fauna thrive. But the Pink Granite Coast is more than just scenery! Immerse yourself in its rich heritage, with Breton chapels, manors, castles, and mysterious megaliths. The Petites Cités de Caractère®, with their timber-framed houses and conserved authenticity, tell the story of a land that's full of life and proud of its traditions. Take the time to ramble along one of our many walking paths to enjoy the sea views as well as our lush natural surroundings. Let yourself fall in love with this corner of Brittany offering both nature and culture, there is something new to discover down every path.



MUST SEES OF THE PINK GRANITE COAST!



Located on the Armorique coast road in Plestin-Les-Grèves, the **Hogolo thermal baths** are a remarkable testimony to the Gallo-Roman presence in Brittany: a living history book that lets you follow the daily journey of the Romans in their ablutions. In addition to its historical interest, the site offers a very beautiful view of the Bay of Locquirec.

The **stairs of Brelevenez** connect the town centre to Brelevenez church (12th century) offering a breathtaking view of Lannion. Pretty houses were built in the 19th century all the way up the 142 steps!





The **Pointe de Bihit** in Trébeurden offers a magnificent view of the Bay of Lannion. The orientation table enables you to locate the different towns surrounding the mouth of the River Léguer reaching as far as the start of the Finistère Coast.

With the rhythm of the tides, **Ile Grande** reveals its different facades and makes the many surrounding islands accessible or not. A 7 km-long coastal path, signposted GR34, takes you around the island in about two and a half hours.





Presqu'île Renote in Trégastel is a protected natural area housing numerous pink granite rock formations, as well as the characteristic fauna and flora of the coast. During your walk, you will have an unobstructed view of the Sept-Îles Archipelago, Ploumanac'h Lighthouse and the Château de Costaërès.

Penvénan is home to the seaside resort of **Port Blanc**. Here you'll find the Chapel of Notre Dame which sits at the top of a flight of stone steps worn by time, and in the heart of the village you will be charmed by its narrow streets and fishermen's houses.





Make your way to the **Castel Meur chasm** in Plougrescant where the waves and sea spray batter the rocks and offer an incredible spectacle to behold.

The **Saint-Tugdual Cathedral** in Tréguier is a magnificent building dedicated to one of the seven founders of Brittany, the Welsh monk Tugdual. You will be impressed by its size, ceilings, stained glass windows, numerous statues, rich furnishings and its charming cloister.





The **Sillon de Talbert** in Pleubian is a geological marvel unique in Europe, a long, natural jetty of sand and pebbles. Combining walking, wildlife observation and breathtaking landscapes, this nature reserve offers beautiful surprises and delightful nature walks!

The **Léguer Valley**, which connects the Monts d'Arrée to the Lannion estuary, is a natural jewel home to remarkable biodiversity, including the European otter and the Atlantic salmon. Classified as a Natura 2000 site since 2004 and labelled Site Rivières Sauvages (Wild River Site) in 2017, it offers a rich architectural and natural heritage, with fountains, mills and walking paths suitable for all activities.






The Vallée paper mills, established on the banks of the Léguer since 1855, were once a major industry in Brittany, and the Kernansquillec hydroelectric dam, built in 1920, marked the extension of this activity. Today, the removal of the dam and the repurposing of the paper mills creates an encounter between industrial history, the arts and the environment.

In Loguivy-Plougras, the **Beffou Forest** or 'the residence of beeches' is an expansive woodland steeped in history! Once a metallurgical site, this forest features an ancient Roman road and is home to one of Brittany's longest covered alleys: the Brohet alley. Spanning 630 ha, it is also the highest woodland in Brittany.










The Pink Granite Coast offers a fascinating spectacle of marine landscapes and remarkable biodiversity. On the foreshore – this beach area uncovered at low tide – life is teeming with crabs, shrimp, shellfish and seaweed. Seabirds, such as oystercatchers and gulls, feed there, demonstrating the importance of this ecosystem.


Fishing, whether on foot or at sea, is an integral part of local life. On the foreshore, clams, mussels and razor clams are picked with care, while offshore, fishermen are catching delicacies such as sea bass, bream and lobsters. Rivers, like the Léguer, offer fish-rich waters. Fishing there is highly regulated, migratory fish such as salmon and brown trout are among the protected species. Nearby, the **Sept-Îles**

including common puffins and northern gannets. Accessible by boat, it is also home to grey seals. At Île Grande, the *League for the Protection of Birds* (LPO) works to safeguard this fragile fauna. This site is a must for exploring the natural treasures of the region while raising awareness of their conservation.











The authenticity and timeless atmosphere of these medieval marvels are enchanting. Tréguier, a former episcopal town, is famous for its Saint-Tugdual Cathedral and its cobbled streets lined with timber-framed houses. In La Roche-Derrien, let yourself be charmed by this former capital of flax and one of the oldest ports on the north coast of Brittany, offering a panoramic view of the Jaudy Valley.

Lannion, city of art.

Between tradition and modernity, Lannion is an invitation to explore. Stroll through its medieval streets and admire the stone buildings that were witness to its rich past, before learning about its central role in technological innovation.

Throughout the year, guided tours, exhibitions and cultural events allow you to enter into the heart of this living history and meet those who bring it to life. Prepare to travel through time and be impressed by a heritage that is the pride of our region!



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AN EXPLOSION OF FLAVOUR

The flavours of the sea blend with the produce of the land, elevated by the talent of local restaurateurs and chefs.

Among the specialities to discover, the oysters of Plougrescant, the shellfish of Landrellec and the mussels of Trédrez-Locquémeau will delight seafood lovers. The taste of the sea is also found in dishes using freshly caught fish, such as sea bass or pollock. Don't miss the inescapable buckwheat pancakes (galettes de sarrasin or blé noir), served with generous fillings, and for sweet treats, let yourself be tempted by a slice of far breton or kouign-amann. The chefs of the Pink Granite Coast make a point of showcasing these products. Our establishments, Michelin starred or not, offer unforgettable gastronomic experiences in enchanting settings.

For an authentic experience, visit the local markets where the stalls are filled with fresh produce: fish, shellfish, seasonal vegetables, and local specialities. This is also an opportunity to meet our passionate producers, who sustain a unique savoir-faire.

Every product has a story, and every encounter with an artisan or a farmer is a door opened to a passion rooted in respect for the land.




